### Phonathon Survey Results

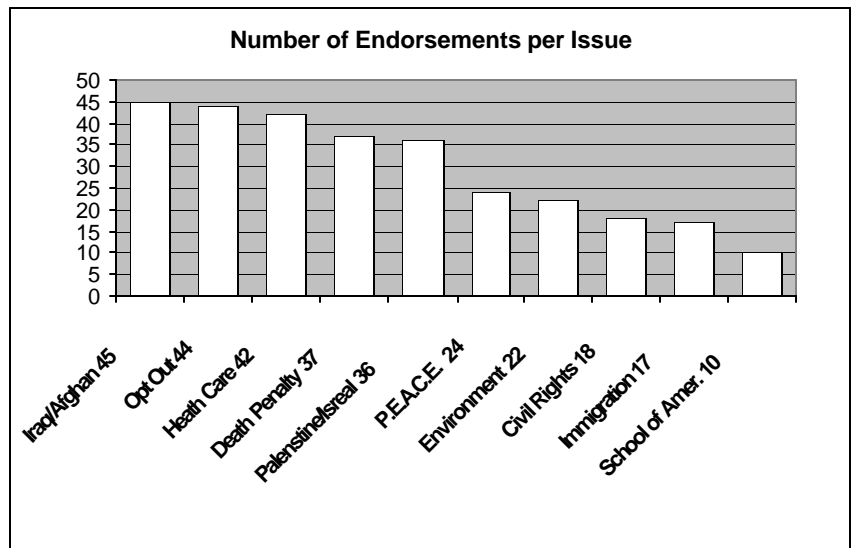
As part of the yearly phone-a-thon this winter, members were polled about which issues we find most important. From a list of ten issues, we asked members to pick the top two or three most important issues addressed by our local Peace and Social Justice Center.

Many members thought that all ten issues were important and good work. Seventy-one members selected a few of their top issues for a total of 295 responses (see chart).

Not surprisingly, these members rated issues of wars in Iraq and Afghanistan most important. Ensuring that schools met the requirements set forth in No Child Left Behind to provide an accessible way to "opt-out" of having student contact information provided to military recruiters was a close second. Our efforts in support of the expansion of health care provisions rounded out the top three issues. We will continue to address these issues with all our might at every fork in the road.

From reform of death penalty laws, to promoting peace between Palestine and Israel, and promoting an understanding of peace in school children, issues the Peace and Social Justice Center faces daily found support among the membership, which validates much of the focus of our current work.

Those issues garnering less support are seen as challenges for the future. We wish to thank everyone who participated as this information is both rewarding and helpful in steering our organizational course.



### Peace Center Calls for Cuts in JROTC in USD 259

The deepening recession continues to have negative effects on our schools. The Wichita school district expects a devastating \$25 million loss for the next school year. School officials are looking to parents, community members, and district employees to choose from a list of services and programs to cut or keep.

In 2009, 57% of high school parents opted out of military recruitment. By contrast, JROTC contributes to the militarization of our youth. JROTC serves a small number of Wichita students compared to the thousands of students in music, art, and foreign language programs. If you serve on a school site council or are employed by the school district, please consider proposing the removal of the JROTC program in favor of protecting reasonable class size, music and art, alternative high schools, latchkey programs, and libraries. These programs are positive choices for our children's future.

## Molly's Brigade/CodePink – Why We Demonstrate

We demonstrate because the streets are ours – and it's one of the most democratic actions we can take. Consider these statistics: Our nation spends **almost 2 billion dollars per day on war – a best-kept secret.** We are almost 4% of the world's population but account for 41% of worldwide military spending. We have 1,445,000 active duty personnel, with another 1.2 million National Guard and other reserve. The Pentagon has over 3.5 million people at its disposal *excluding* private military contractors (think Blackwater) and a current military and war budget exceeding 1.1 trillion dollars. The U.S. sells or gives its Gods of Metal to nearly two-thirds of the world's nations accounting for 68.4 percent of the global arms sales (think Taliban). The U.S. has established control over at least 191 governments and has over 700 (low estimate) military bases on foreign soil – and 12,000 nuclear weapons (think Hiroshima/Nagasaki). Dr. Margaret Flowers, pediatrician, appeared at the White House gate – letter in hand, addressed to President Obama – she was asking him to revive the concept of single-payer healthcare. She, along with her colleague, Dr. Carol Paris, were eventually arrested and handcuffed. Both doctors are members of Physicians for a National Health Program (PNHP), with Dr. Flowers being a Congressional Fellow for the organization.

This was not the first arrest for Dr. Flowers. Senator Max Baucus (D-MT) had her arrested at a Senate Finance Committee meeting when she and her group asked for a "place at the table" for hearings on a Senate health care plan. Dr. Flowers knows first hand how terribly broken the democratic process is. ## Musleh and Poage report on their trip to the Gaza Freedom March

Friends of the Peace Center, Maher Musleh and Rev. Michael Poage, were welcomed back from their recent trip to Cairo to join the Gaza Freedom March. Forty people joined in to welcome them and to hear their report at a potluck on Feb. 23. In Cairo, they participated in the demonstrations by 1400 international marchers, who were denied entry into Gaza by the Egyptian government after being promised cooperation. They continued their journey visiting Maher's relatives in Jordan and the Israeli-occupied West Bank. The family was originally from Tulkarm, a town in the West Bank. This was the first of several reports they will present in and around Wichita.

## School Safety with Dignity for Students

Suspended for throwing a tater tot. Arrested for shoving a fellow student. Sent to jail for doodling on a desk. These types of stories are all over the media across the country. Many of these types of incidents occur in the Wichita area every year. In an effort to keep schools safe, students are being treated as criminals. Many argue it seems that common sense and old-fashioned school discipline have fallen by the wayside in favor of stricter zero-tolerance policies for non-criminal behavior. Instead of detention, it's handcuffs and a juvenile criminal record.

The ACLU of Kansas and Western Missouri has been working for several months to create a taskforce and action plan to help stem the tide of kids being pushed through the school-to-prison pipeline. The School Safety with Dignity program seeks to bring community organizations and the Wichita school district together to create ways to treat students with the dignity they deserve and the safety they require. The Peace Center is proud to be part of this taskforce to create a safe environment for education without criminalizing students. Similar programs are sprouting up across the country as communities realize the implications of criminalizing students.

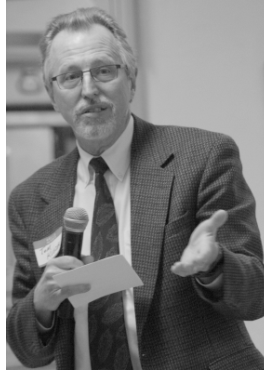
## Death Penalty Abolition Senate Vote

When the Senators voted on Final Action, the vote was **20-20**, so SB 375 did not advance to the House. This was the first Senate vote since 1994 on the question of death penalty retention/abolition.

## Dr. Thomas Kluzak Speaks on the Current State of Health Care Reform



At our annual meeting and dinner last December, we were honored to hear Dr. Thomas Kluzak, of the Physicians for a National Health Program, speak about the current state of health care reform. Dr. Kluzak spoke about the goal of Medicare-for-All, universal health care which has eluded Americans for decades. Publicly funded universal health care would end the tragedy of the uninsured, denials of coverage for pre-existing conditions, medical bankruptcies, reduce costs overall and even improve science in medicine with the central collection of data.

The movement toward genuine universal health care is being held up by the power of the health insurance and drug company lobbies, which have succeeded in buying the influence of many of our elected officials. These lobbies are protecting their interests in a for-profit health care system. They have reduced genuine reform to a law dealing with insurance company abuses like denial of health care for pre-existing conditions. The public option disappeared in the Senate bill, replaced by a mandate that people buy private insurance, some with government subsidies to help pay the for-profit insurance companies for their coverage.

Local and national organizations and activists have continued to press for genuine universal health care demanding "Everybody in, nobody out!" The Peace and Social Justice Center continues to support the call for publicly funded, universal health care. We want a system in which health care is a human right, not a privilege for only those who can afford it. We support Medicare-for-All.
